COMMUNITY OUTREACH SPECIALIST POSITION (COS)

Team: Florence Randolph Sgt. Naomi Watson Chief Carlson

On October 12, 2020 The YSPD appointed Ms. Florence Randolph to fulltime status.

STATUS: January 1 – October 31, 2020

Funds from grants - donations distributed through the YSPD COS Department.

- \$25,000 on housing servicing 64 people from Covid-19 pandemic funds
- \$20,000 on utilities servicing 77 people from Covid-19 pandemic funds
- \$616 on gloves, sleeping bags, caps, socks, desk timers, clock for learning center from grant
- \$3,000 on food from grant for school meals in the month of August alone servicing 43 people
- \$4,000.00 snack bag meals distributed from officers to community children. This has been a great way to distribute food on a daily basis. Officers keep a supply in the vehicles on every shift.
- \$5,025.00 Food vouchers handed out in 2020 to date.
- \$250.00 Speedway Gas cards
- \$750.00 Subway Gift Cards
- \$2,360.00 Additional utilities and food
- \$2,600.00 YSPD Coats for Kids program
- \$15,000 rent and utilities Covid-19 pandemic funds.



The Ohio Collaborative is a twelve-person panel in Ohio that establishes statewide standards for law enforcement agencies.

 The Ohio Collaborative's initial recommendations were on guidelines for use of force and employee recruitment. They have since published standards on bias - free policing, body worn cameras, community engagement, and tele - communicator training.
 Agencies that comply with the guidelines set forth through the Collaborative gain certification. This process has brought the department "up-to-date" so that it complies with efficacy and best practice.

STATUS: Completion of Phase I; Phase II complete.

STATUS: This program is ongoing.






LEXIPOL provides policy management software in regards to public safety and provides state-specific policies that allow customization to fit within Village guidelines and compliancy with state and federal guidelines. Officers are able to access policies. Officers can have real time access to policies and procedures, even from their mobile devices. LEXIPOL provides officers with policy specific daily training bulletins (DTB's), allowing officers to review each month with training scenarios that include the subject matter on topics such as use of force, biases, as well as procedures and professional standards. A compilation of the standards are then adapted into the overarching YSPD Policy Manual.

STATUS: The YSPD Policy Manual is continually updated with added input from both the community and Justice System Collaborative Committee (JSCC). Critical best practices through guidance of the Attorney General (AG) have been completed. This will be an ongoing project due to the fluidity of the law and direction of the AG.



CIT is a police-based pre-arrest jail diversion program as well as a training method to assist officers in recognizing mental health issues on calls for service. The program is designed to create a seamless link between law enforcement and emergency mental health services. The link is difficult to facilitate for a variety of reasons. Having a staff member (COS) dedicated to assisting the officers has made the process much easier and more productive.

STATUS: All YSPD Officers are CIT certified. This is mandatory training for all sworn personnel.

A concept created by Magistrate Amy Lewis, Handle With Care is a program that allows officers to contact a single point of contact following a critical and/or domestic incident involving a child. The officer makes one call, giving the contact the child's name. The officer relays "handle with care", the contact spreads the message to the schools, caregivers, and any other association the child may be involved with the following day.

STATUS: On hold until notification due to COVID 19 restrictions




